## Learn about current events!

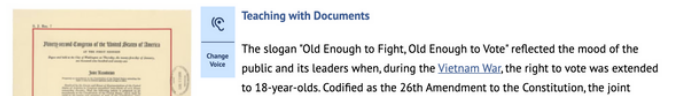
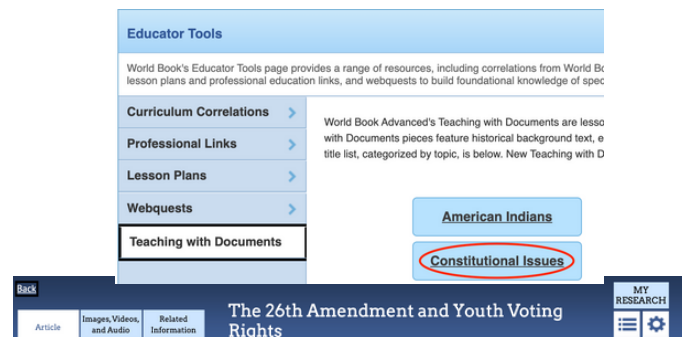


1. Choose an article from **Behind the Headlines**.
2. Read the article and answer **who**, **what**, **when**, and **where** about the article then explain **why** it is important.
3. Use World Book Online to research related topics and connect this event to another current event or important event in history.



## Explore history through primary sources!

1. Have students learn more about voting rights using Primary Sources!
2. Find the lesson in **Teaching with Documents**. (**Research and Resources** → **Educator Tools**)
3. Click on **Teaching with Documents**, then choose your topic (**Constitutional Issues** in this example).
4. Read the document for ideas to build background knowledge, then have students answer the **Discussion Questions**, found at the bottom of the page.

# Complete a research project.

Research a topic using **Search** and write a short paper.
